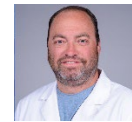

This impactful presentation will spotlight Indiana's pioneering role in leading the Midwest EMS in the delivery of LTO+WB. The comprehensive discussion will cover key starting points, the essence of LTO+WB, along with the valuable benefits and essential lessons learned to steer clear of potential pitfalls during your implementation. Furthermore, we will delve into crucial aspects such as clinical indications for blood administration, resuscitation of patients in severe hemorrhagic shock, effective control of life-threatening hemorrhage through diverse methods and devices available to pre-hospital providers, the utilization of TXA in patients receiving a pre-hospital blood transfusion, and the strategic implementation of Critical Risk Reduction programs to bolster whole blood efforts. This presentation aims to emphasize that as pre-hospital providers, there exists a wealth of impactful interventions beyond traditional "Diesel Therapy".

Abstract: Shortly after midnight on July 20, 2012, a 25-year-old male exited Theater 9 of the Century 16 Theater in Aurora, Colorado, through the emergency exit door. He went to his car, donned tactical gear and a gasmask, and armed himself with a shotgun, rifle, pistol, and tear gas. He re-entered the theater through the emergency exit, which he had propped open, tossed tear gas into the audience, and began shooting into the crowd. In less than 5 minutes, he shot or otherwise wounded 70 innocent people, killing 12 of them. He was apprehended shortly after he again exited through the emergency exit door. Many of the wounded that night were also carried out through that same exit door and triaged near where the shooter had parked his car. Over 25 of these wounded were transported to area hospitals in police vehicles. Not only had the shooter attacked the theater, but he also set a trap for first responders and/or his neighbors. This presentation will cover some of the steps the shooter took to prepare for his assault and some recordings of radio transmissions from the incident. It will recognize some of the heroism of everyday people just out to enjoy a movie. It will also discuss some of the issues related to rendering the apartment safe along

Abstract: This session will focus on disaster responses across the State of Indiana. Chief Pascal Arnes will talk about lessons learned during the April 2023 Sullivan County Tornado and the March 2024 Randolph County Tornado responses and how Incident Management Teams play a huge role throughout the response and recovery phases. He will also discuss the revitalization of the Incident Management Assistance Team (IMAT) Program with the Indiana Department of Home Security (IDHS) and how they can play a key role with in-state disasters, while utilizing the State Emergency Operations Center as a supporting mechanism. The Mobile Support Unit (MSU) and other policies will be discussed for activation and mobilization of resources. Discussions will also involve the plan moving forward as the IMAT integrates with the FEMA Supplemental Response Team (SRT) program. This session will also allow for collaborative idea sharing and identifying the responsibilities of local, state, and federal resources as it pertains to daily functions and while transitioning into disaster mobilizations.

2424 Mental Health: Did We Plan for This?

Abstract; Mental health has become a hot topic over the past several years. Mental health EMS calls, ED visits and in-patient stays have all increased, as have our incidents of disasters and emergencies. Unfortunately, the number of mental healthcare providers has not followed this trend.

Mental health concerns rise after any major event and should be included in all disaster plans. It has also been recognized that everyday traumatic injuries can lead to mental health problems in children. The most recent American College of Surgeons – Committee on Trauma Grey Book includes a standard requiring Level I and II Trauma Centers to have a mental health screening process for traumatically injured patients. What tools are out there? How can EMS and others in the field assist with this process? This presentation will introduce the audience to the importance of mental health triage of the traumatically injured pediatric patient and several possible tools available.
